Introduction

Allowing the option for Family Presence During Resuscitation enables family members to be present during the resuscitation efforts of a loved one. The focus of this process is to provide support to the patient and their family, while also providing transparency and trust in the medical process and personnel.

- Family Presence During Resuscitation can be extremely relevant in elderly patients who have lower survival rates after cardiac resuscitation.
- There is some reluctance to adapt to Family Presence During Resuscitation with concerns that family members may misunderstand ACLS protocols.
- Family members who were not able to witness CPR on loved ones experienced more symptoms of anxiety and depression than those who were present.
- ➤ On the contrary, the experience of watching a resuscitation may be traumatizing for family members and family members presence can cause performance anxiety in medical personnel.

Purpose

Identifying the impact on witnessing life saving measures on family members

- To identify if there are more positive or negative impacts for family observing resuscitation
- Determine if having a family member experience a near life ending event is traumatizing for the patient and their family
- Some families might experience understanding and a sense of acceptance while viewing CPR and BLS, knowing they could be there for their loved ones

Methodology

This literature review included adults in cardiac arrest in any setting where family may be present. The study results varied with each situation resulting in various conclusions.

- Some members of the study experienced higher levels of PTSD for example while others experienced less symptoms of PTSD.
- Hypothetical studies were excluded.
- Outcomes studied: patient, (or) family outcomes, (and) provider outcomes.
- Medline, CINAHL
- Excerpta Medical Database (May, 2022)
- Alfred Health, Victoria, Australia (Appendix 1.)

Results

Based on the literature, the results of having family present during patient resuscitation is an individualized experience.

- ➤ Positive aspects: Increased closure and the opportunity to ask questions in the moment.
- Negative aspects: lack of privacy, lack of support from staff, and trauma from watching a loved one be resuscitated.
- There is an increased need for policies within the healthcare system regarding family involvement in resuscitation, as each case is highly individualized.
- Research shows that it would be most beneficial to provide the families with the option to choose whether they would like to be present or not.

Next Steps

Giving family the option:

Based on the following research, the most appropriate next steps would include developing and implementing a policy that allows for the family and patient,, to decide whether they would like to be present during resuscitation.

Additional steps needed:

- Conduct more research on the impact of grief for the family members witnessing the resuscitation.
- Have a team member available for the family members to answer questions related to their presence during resuscitation.
- RRH would provide team members with education surrounding FPDR, including current research and outcomes.
